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Apostrophes

Rules for Using Apostrophes

- 1. Add an apostrophe to a noun to show possession:
- For a singular noun or a plural noun that doesn't end in s (like sheep), add 's. **Example:** "Catherine's mother would rinse the dust-coated plates before meals." (p. 8)
- For a plural noun ending in s (like friends), just add the apostrophe.
 Example: "I look up and see kids' gluteal regions, as Thaddeus would say." (p. 13)
- **2.** Use an apostrophe to replace missing letters in a contraction.

Example: "That's when I see it." (p. 15)
